Some other historic features of the Parish



Records show that in November 1902 Finchampstead Parish Council accepted an offer from a Mr Walter to install a pump "over the Parish Well at the side of the highway opposite to Manor Farm"

The feature sits on the north side of the B3348 Rectory Hill.



The Dozzell's stone is located on the B3348 Fleet Hill.

The wording on the plaque is given below.



THIS TABLET MARKS THE SITE OF THE ANCIENT DOZZELL'S WELL
BELIEVED TO HAVE BEEN BLESSED BY ST. OSWALD KING OF
NORTHUMBRIA IN THE YEAR A.D.635 WHEN
VISITING CYNEGILS KING OF THE WEST SAXONS WHOSE
DAUGHTER HE MARRIED.

THE SILVER JUBILEE OF THEIR GREATLY LOVED SOVEREIGN
QUEEN ELIZABETH II

Some other historic features of the Parish



This stone is located on Soldiers Rise.





An orientation or trigonometry point at The Ridges, owned by the National Trust.



Features on a wall north west of St James' Church. The wall is listed under the Planning (Listed Buildings and Conservation Areas) Act 1990 as amended for its special architectural or historic interest. English Heritage List entry no. 1319142.

The 22m long wall is built from 17th century brick and has a doorway at its east end. It forms the remains of a former building, probably the old manor house of East Court which once stood on this site.
