





Remembrance 2022

The sun shone for the Remembrance Parade and Service at the Memorial Park on 13 November.

The Parade was an impressive sight. It was led by Royal Navy Sub-Lieutenant Harry Jukes and the Reverend Leonard Onugha, followed by veterans and a huge number of young people from the local uniformed groups - Scouts, Cubs, Beavers, Guides, Brownies and Rainbows - plus their leaders.

The Service held at the War Memorial included a rededication of the Memorial in its new setting adjacent to the Park.

We estimate that around 300 people were present at this important local event.




Finchampstead C of E (Aided) Primary School held a Remembrance Assembly at the War Memorial on 11 November.

Ground-breaking regeneration work starts at Gorse Ride

The regeneration continues with ground works starting on Phase 2A of the project.

The contractor, Wates Residential, will be on site for 36 weeks undertaking enabling works including trenching for new drainage and infrastructure for services, levelling the ground, digging and building foundations up to the damp proof course level. Works will also start to form the new roads



The project will see 249 new modern homes built on site which includes an incredible 74% of affordable homes to meet growing local demand. Four properties will be designed to accommodate the needs of people moving into the regenerated new homes for example wheelchair accessible with level access to shower facilities.

The housing regeneration scheme will see homes built for the future with sustainability in mind. This includes high levels of insulation and low carbon innovations to help residents heat their homes efficiently, helping to tackle the fuel poverty crisis whilst also reducing the borough's carbon footprint.



Closure of the Gorse Ride Woods play area

Following a safety inspection of the Gorse Ride Woods play area, the Borough Council has announced that unfortunately it needs to be closed immediately.

Works on utilities need to take place underground beneath the park for the Gorse Ride redevelopment and the hoarding initially installed is too close to the play equipment.

The Borough Council said that it had hoped to keep some of the park open whilst work takes place, however the safety of residents is the priority.

A new park will be provided in the regenerated community. In the meantime, please do make use of the nearby play areas at the FBC and California Country Park.

WHAT DO LOCAL COUNCILS DO?

Your local (parish and town) council has overall responsibility for the wellbeing of your local community. Their work falls into three main categories:

- Delivery of services
- Improve quality of life for residents
- Give communities a democratic voice

Local councils run numerous services, depending on the size of the council. Many you will see day-to-day, but some are less known. These include introducing solar panels, setting up dementia-friendly groups, organising community buses, creating neighbourhood plans, implementing suitable housing, establishing youth projects, managing allotments and open spaces, maintaining footpaths, public seating and litter bins.

BECOMING A LOCAL COUNCILLOR

As a local councillor you can become a voice for your community and make real change. Local councillors are the champions of their community who invest time in local projects and issues to the benefit of residents and the neighbourhood.


Local councillor responsibilities fall into three main categories:

- Decision-making
- Monitoring
- Getting involved locally

Local councillors attend to local needs of residents, local groups and businesses, make decisions on local services, collaborate with district and borough councils to adhere to local needs, and progress vital projects to invest in the future of the community.







Recycle broken plastic buckets, plant pots and more

Do you have any rigid plastic items at home that you want to throw away?

Common rigid plastic items in households include plastic buckets, milk crates, laundry baskets, storage boxes, garden furniture, pet carriers, toys, plastic plant pots and more.

Instead of throwing them away and having them sent to landfill, things like old toys or garden furniture, if they are still in good condition, could be given a second life by donating them to a charity or sell them to the others.

If they can't be re-used or repaired anymore, take them to the re3 household waste recycling centres in Reading and Bracknell. They will be recycled and turned into high-quality, almost 100%-pure secondary raw material for producing new products.

However, rigid plastic items contaminated with paint can't be accepted. Neither will fibreglass sheets, garden hoses, plastic film, or car seats with textiles.

Recycling rigid plastic also reduces carbon (CO2) emissions. It is estimated that every 100 tonnes of recycled rigid plastic can contribute to avoid 250,000 kg CO2 emissions, which is equivalent to the consumption of 180 cars.

Seal your green bags

As we have entered a wet season, please don't forget to seal your green recycling bags whenever they are out. Remember to also tuck the two sides of the bags in to better protect the recycling from the rain.

Recently, four loads of recycling were rejected at the recycling plant because of the soaked paper and cardboard inside. It can still be processed as recycling if it is a bit damp, but when it is soaked through it will most likely be rejected.

If the load is rejected, it has to be disposed of like general rubbish. It is not only worse for the environment, but also costs us twice as much.

Each of the 9 libraries in Wokingham Borough provides a wide range of services including book and audiobook lending; online books, newspapers and magazines; music streaming, children and adult activities and events. Also on offer is free public computers; free public Wi-Fi, which can be used on own devices; printing and scanning, and space for studying. Libraries act as a community hub where people can collect refuse bags, seek advice and information, apply for jobs, apply for benefits and other online applications and access and find out more about council services.

The survey will inform the council how libraries can best meet the needs of residents and communities now, and in the future.

What a way to spend a Winter's Day!

In November the regular volunteer team from the Friends of Finchampstead Ridges were joined by our corporate partners from Salesforce to assist with the Heathland clearance.

The Heathland is a precious habitat in the UK and particularly in the South of England. It is important that the invasive self-seeded Birch and also Bracken is regularly removed to encourage the growth of the Heather.

We aim to manage this environment so that there is an age range in terms of plants this can then benefit birds who look for this habitat which include Nightjar, Dartford Warbler and Stonechat also a number of invertebrates make this habitat their home. The ideal time to carry out this work is out of nesting season.



Another area South of the this pocket of Heathland also needed attention following the removal of Rhododendron in recent years. The task here was to cut and burn the previously cut Rhododendron and to discourage further by cutting back the regrowth.

If you can't eat them all, put any food waste into your food waste container to turn it into fertilizer
